The night's setting was the Hotel Jermyn, a beautiful building







designed by John A. Duckworth. Previously, the property was home to the Forest House, which was razed late in 1894 or early 1895 to make way for The Jermyn.

Mr. John Jermyn had difficulty with the city while obtaining a permit for his new building. The design meant the building would encroach on the reservation on Spruce Street. Jermyn and the city fought the dispute in court before the ruling came down in Jermyn's favor.

Jermyn encountered another challenge to his plans for a large hotel. He was unable to come to terms with the owner of the adjoining property on Wyoming Avenue. Plans were drawn up for the building to be limited only to the Forest House site. Shortly before the building began, however, Jermyn and the adjoining property owner came to terms, and the plans were revised. The Hotel Jermyn would be the enlarged structure that we know today.

One of Scranton's first all-steel structures, the Hotel Jermyn opened under the management of Fred S. Godfrey—a day John Jermyn dreamt of but was unable to see. He died in 1902. The property and the building went through several changes of ownership in its initial decades.

Jermyn's estate was managed by Joseph and George B. Jermyn. In 1923 George B. Jermyn sold the hotel to George Maxey and Frank P. Benjamin. From 1926 to 1937 the hotel was sold to several different individuals. This became known as the Jermyn Hotel Corp.

Ownership continued to change after the property was seized by Metropolitan Life Insurance Company in 1937.

Time and changing lifestyles took away the Jermyn's business model, and today the Jermyn Hotel is no longer a hotel. The building provides permanent housing for the elderly and disabled individuals. The Electric Theater Company—the site of our first spring event-finds its home in the second floor Spruce Street side of the historic Hotel Jermyn.
